North Carolina Fact Sheet

I. Enrollment and Growth since 2000

In North Carolina, charter school enrollment increased from 15,523 in 2000-01 to 31,193 in 2007-08 (a 101% increase from 2000-2007). In 2007-08, 2.2% of all public school students were enrolled in charter schools. In 2000-01, there were ninety charter schools in North Carolina, a number which increased by one in 2007-08.

There were three metropolitan areas with at least thirteen charter schools in North Carolina. In each of these metros, at least two percent of public school students were in charter schools. Durham had the highest share of metropolitan area students in charter schools.



II. Racial/Ethnic Composition of Charter Schools

Of the 31,192 students in North Carolina charter schools, 61% were White, 31% were Black, and 4% were Latino. The public schools consisted of approximately 56% White, 29% Black, and 11% Latino students.

In the three metropolitan areas of North Carolina with a substantial number of charter schools, White and Black students comprised the vast majority of charter school students. In each, White students comprised a higher percentage of the charter school enrollment than of the traditional public school enrollment. While Latino students made up between 12 and 15% of the public school enrollment in each MSA, they comprised no more than 4% of the charter school enrollment.

III. <u>Segregation of Schools</u>

Segregated Minority Schools

Even though charter schools enrolled a higher percentage of White students than public schools, Black and Latino students in charter schools were enrolled in intensely segregated minority schools at much higher rates than their public school peers.

In 2007-08, the percentage of charter and public students in schools that were 90-100% minority reached no more than 20% in each metro. In the Raleigh metro, charter schools have a considerably higher percentage of students in these intensely segregated minority schools.

Segregated White Schools

White charter school students were more likely to be in segregated White schools (20% for segregated white charter schools and 16% for segregated White public schools). In 2007-08, 3% of Latino students in both White charter and traditional public schools were in segregated White schools. About 2% of Blacks students attended segregated White charter schools, compared to only 1% in segregated White segregated public schools in North Carolina.

Similar to above, where we saw higher percentage of charter students in segregated minority schools in North Carolina's metropolitan areas, in two metros with at least a dozen charter schools, higher percentages of charter students enrolled in segregated White schools as well.

IV. Interracial Exposure

During 2007-08, White students experienced higher isolation in charter schools than in public schools in North Carolina. Whites also had a lower exposure to minorities in charter schools (14% to Blacks and 3% to Latinos) than in traditional public schools.

In North Carolina, during 2007-08, Black isolation was higher in charter schools (64% charter to 48% public) while Latino isolation was higher in public schools (20% public to 16% charter).


In 2007-08, Blacks and Latinos both had higher exposure to white students in the traditional public schools than in charter schools in North Carolina.

V. <u>Geographic Location of Charter Schools</u>

During 2007-08, approximately 52% of North Carolina's enrollment of charter school students went to schools that were in rural or town areas, 12% went to schools in the suburbs, and 36% in the city. In comparison, approximately 59% of North Carolina's enrollment of traditional public school students attended schools in rural or town areas, 16% in the suburbs, and a quarter in the city.

VI. State Legislation about Diversity

• After one year, charter school must reasonably reflect racial and ethnic composition of the local school administrative unit or the special population the school seeks to serve within that unit, and the school will be subject to any court-ordered desegregation plan in effect for the unit.¹
